Falls Safety Session

[Registration](#) is now open for our September Safety Session! ***Innovations in Fall-Injury Prevention and Reduction Strategies across the Continuum of Care:***

From 2007-2016, fall death rates in the U.S. increased 30%. If rates continue to rise, the projection by 2030 is that seven people will die every hour as a result of a fall. The most common cause of traumatic brain injuries are falls, resulting in serious and costly outcomes (CDC, 2017). The impact of a fall is far reaching, including the patient, family and care team across the healthcare continuum. Attendees will hear practical insights from leading falls expert, Pat Quigley, PhD, MPH, APRN, CRRN, FAAN, FAANP and Illinois' HSHS St. Mary's Hospital for reducing falls in both inpatient and outpatient setting.

ALTO Project Cohort 2 Recruitment Webinar
